



Student at 80!

Age is no barrier if you determine to pursue education or achieve anything you have set your heart on. Here is the case of an 80-year old grandpa Jaydev Kishor Thakur. At an age when most of senior citizens give up hope for life, here is this grand old man pursuing graduation with the enthusiasm that will put even a youngster to shame! Thakur recently appeared for his graduation examination from HPT college run by Gokhale education society. Thakur is unlike others of his age. According to him, there is no age limit for education and that one must keep learning all through life. Looking at his enthusiasm and liking for education, one does not know whether he should still be called a grandfather. On the other hand, the youngsters who bunk lectures should a lesson and imitate his determination to pursue education.

Thakur was born on January 7, 1933 in Shirpur in Dhule district. His father died when Thakur was just 10 years old. He then came to Mumbai in search of employment. He did odd jobs and kept studying. After some time, he got a job in Nashik's general post office. He used to work during day and attended night school. He cleared 11th class board exam with first class.

Earlier the 11th class exam was conducted by the education board. Thakur got the post of a clerk in the post office. His faith in education and love for learning helped him get promotion after promotion. He worked as wireless inspector, assistant postmaster, supervisor, and so on. However, due to the burden of official work and his expanding family impeded his plan for formal education. Hence his education remained incomplete. His filial responsibility increased. Later his children settled in Nashik and Thakur also retired from service. Since he was fond of reading, he decided to spend the retirement while reading. Once he read in a newspaper that those who had passed Old SSC before 1975 were eligible for admission to the first year of graduation degree course.

This news rekindled the fire for education that had remained dormant in him all these years and he decided to seek admission. Soon after admission, he started his study and cleared the first year with 51 % marks. He never missed a single lecture and always mingled freely with students of his grandchildren's age. He used to study along with his grand child at night. When asked about his determination, he quotes Mahatma Gandhi who stressed the need for making learning a life-long activity. Education never goes waste, he adds.



An ideal teacher

Just imagine a teacher who fords through river everyday at a grave risk to her life and then starts teaching students after changing her wet clothes. No ordinary teacher this! She is none other than Swati Narayan Wankhede, the teacher who teaches at tribal hamlet and at the same time she enrolled with Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University for pursuing higher education. Interestingly, she did all this while looking after her family. This is nothing but strong determination! Nothing can be achieved without strong determination. She is no ordinary teacher. For, she has no vehicle to carry her to school or road leading to her school. The school is situated across the bank of the river and there is no boat to carry her across. This teacher reaches her school by using an aerated tube to swim to the school. The school is situated at Sherpada which is 20km away from Nashik. She would walk through or swim through the river to reach the school. Her uncommon determination and sense of duty put Sherpada on world map. Since she would get wet while reaching the school, the teacher would keep a couple of sarees at school itself.

During the monsoon when the river is in spate, the teacher would use an aerated tube of

truck to cross the river.

She had to cross the river twice a day; while reaching the school to teach students and while returning home. No teacher can accomplish all this without determination.

Swati Wankhede's greatness is not confined to passing through the river. She has undertaken a number of academic, social awareness projects like 'akshardindi', 'akshargudi', 'shardotsav', ' savitri classes', 'geetai pathan', 'palak dattak yojna', aksharshala and aksharpanti during Diwali, among others for upliftment of the tribals. While educating others, she also kept educating herself. The society took note of her selfless service and in 1970, she was awarded the state government's Savitribai Fule Adarsh Shikshika award. She also got several other prizes and awards. Swati Wankhede lives in Nashik and is employed with Zilla Parishad school. Ever since her appointment, she has been teaching at tribal hamlets and villages. She never sought a transfer to the place of convenience. On the other hand, she adjusted herself to the prevailing circumstances. While accomplishing her goal of educating the masses, she faced many problems but she overcame them successfully due to her staunch faith in education.

On fast track to MPSC career!

The general perception is that girls in the rural area lag behind their urban counterparts as far as higher education is concerned. But here is the story of girl student who successfully fought all the hurdles in her way to realise her dream of donning the uniform!

Kavita Thonge topped the Maharashtra Public Service Commission (MPSC) exam for the post of police sub-inspector. She had failed in the first attempt but did not lose heart. On the other hand, she studied with renewed vigour and passed the competitive exam with flying colours. Her success is all the more praiseworthy as it was achieved without any academic background and it is the result of her resolute determin ation which will serve as an inspiration to the students from the rural area.

Kavita hails from Kohkali in Parner taluka of Ahmednagar district. Her father worked her a garage while her mother is a farm labour. Her parents always nursed the dream of giving her university education and Kavita also reciprocated their dream by her singular devotion to study. Most people nurse the dream in childhood, but there are very few who strive to fulfil that dream by overcoming adverse circumstances. kavita Thonge belongs to that rare category of people who not only nurse a dream but ensure that it is fulfilled. She completed her SSC and

then dreamt of college life. She wanted to pursue higher education along with her school mates. But unfortunately, her father met with an accident. Now she became busy climbing the steps of the hospital where her father was admitted. The accident brought a calamity in her household. The sudden illness of her father caused a quick turnaround in her family's condition. Now her dream of becoming a police officer lay shattered. However Kavita was not the person to accept this sordid condition and then she made a resolve to complete her education by staying at her maternal uncle's house.

She cleared Common Entrance Test (CET) for D.Ed and got admission into a government college. Instead of baton, she now held the chalk and faced the blackboard. She took up a teaching job at village Gonde Dumala near Igatpuri in Nashik district. Soon she was married. She resided at Nashik and taught at Igatpuri taluka. Her dream got full support after marriage. Her husband Dr Samadhan Hire encouraged her to appear for competitive exams as he himself appeared for them. He relieved her of many familial chores and boosted her confidence. At first she could not appear for the test due to some technical glitches. But she did not lose hope and studied on. Within 2 months after their marriage, both Kavita and her husband

cleared the MPSC exams. Kavita attributes her success to the encouragement she received from her husband and the favourable atmosphere at her in-law's home. Now they have nursed another dream of becoming DySP by 2015. She had attended coaching classes for some months ahead of MPSC exams. She achieved a new level of success after completing her graduation and later post-graduation from the Open University, firmly sending the message of self-study.

Her message to the students is: First fix your goal and then make concerted efforts. You may not succeed immediately, but you should not get upset on account of failure. Students

should continue to study determinedly and achieve the goal. Honest efforts always succeed, says Kavita.

The growing instances of atrocities on women disturb her and hence she has decided to use her uniform to curb the atrocities against women. She wants to encourage women to pursue education and stand on own feet. Now Kavita has set herself a new goal of becoming a gazetted officer by 2015. She has already fulfilled the dream of her parents and she is sure to fulfil her new dream also.

Q: Why did you decide to enrol yourself with Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University?

MD: I wanted to study journalism. But I took

admission in another course. Thus my desire to study journalism remained unfulfilled. Hence I decided to seek admission in BA CMJ course and opted for HPT college study centre. Moreover, it allowed me to pursue journalism without the compulsion of attending the classes regularly.

Q: What is your opinion about the Open education system?

MD: O p e n education system is distance education system. Here the students are not bound by the limitations of time, place or even age. You can study as per you convenience at

home. Though there is no compulsion of attending the classes everyday, the guest lectures are highly useful and informative. Since the emphasis is on self-study, you get to learn a lot through experience. The textbooks are packed with all relevant knowledge in simple language and hence you can even do without teacher. All this



increased my self-confidence and hence I studied journalism for three years without any stress.

Q: How did your education in the YCMOU benefit you?

MD: While doing my journalism course at the YCMOU, I had also enrolled for a fashion designing course in the KK Wagh college. While doing these two courses, I was also acting in TV serials. I was also doing internship in Maharashtra Times. Thanks to the YCMOU, I got the opportunity to complete my course in journalism without any problem.

Q: What would you tell us about your introduction to the theatre?

MD: I was in eighth standard in Maratha school when I first participated in children's drama contest. This developed a liking in me for theatre and then decided to follow this line. I focused on dancing and appeared for Katthak dance exams. I was trained in Katthak form of dancing under the guidance of Jaikumar Khele and Karuna Tile. Soon I was introduced to Praveen Kalokhe and joined the Genius group. Soon roles started coming my way and I got opportunities to work in theatre, serials and film. Hard work and determination hold the key to success.

Q: You have worked in several serials. Which are your favourite characters?

MD: Both Manjiri and Shamika are my favourite

characters. The character of Shamika in the show 'Mazhiya Priyala Preet Kalena' is important. I feel the character of a simple innocent and a bit naive girl who totally loves her parents and is family oriented with the girl next door values made the viewers identify with her and touched a chord somewhere. Q: What role did your family play in your career?

My self-esteem suffered when I got promoted to standard X on grace marks. Later I fell ill and lost the whole year. This further added to my sadness. But due the blessings of my parents and teacher, I got though the SSC with 69 percent marks. I sought admission in commerce stream as the science education was beyond the budget of my poor family. I passed the HSC with 79 marks, the success gladdened hearts of my parents. People were advising me to go for Chartered accountancy, but my father insisted that I should complete my D.Ed first like my sisters to stand on my own. Soon I was married to the brother-in-law of my elder sister. I was afraid I might not be able to complete my education. Within a year, I was blessed with a girl child and I received a job call from Jalgaon Zilla Parishad.

Meanwhile, my husband quit CRPF due to domestic reasons. His future planning also did not

succeed. I faced all the problems encountered by women while receiving education like marriage, family, children, job at far-off place, and residing at village, among others. While bringing up my daughter, I got the best help from Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University to pursue my dream of higher education. Battling out the domestic issues and economic stress, I enrolled for FYBA in 2006 with English literature. But due to my D.Ed, I was directly admitted to the second year of BA. I stayed in Satara in 2000 for the sake of education of my children. My son was in Xth standard and daughter in VII. Luckily that time I met a great teacher Dr Mrs Ghorpade,

she encouraged me to do BA from Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University. I applied for entrance and cleared it. I became a graduate within 3 years and my degree was sent to LBS College, Satara. That was the biggest moment of happiness in my life. I am thankful to the Open University and Ghorpade madam. Being elder daughter, I used to help my mother in housework. My father was a mason at village Khurd (Loni) in Ahmednagar district but he did not get regular work and hence the family suffered. Hence our family shifted to Agartakli in Nashik in 1988. Now my father got regular work but he got into the habit of gambling. Whatever he earned, he gambled away, pushing the family into worst financial crisis. At last my mother began to sell vegetables and I also helped her in this business.

During rainy season, when there were no takers for vegetables, my mother would do domestic work like cleaning utensils and thus earned money to keep household running. I was married on May 17, 1995. My husband worked in a factory in Ambad while I did housework. A daughter was born to me in 1999 and household expenses went up. Meanwhile, my husband lost

his job but he did not lose heart and did odd jobs. However we faced penury during this time.

I always thought that I should do something. But due to lack of proper education and guidance, I could not do anything. I bought a few sheep and my mother-in-law did housework. One day my mother-in-law gave me Rs 1500 and my mother gave me Rs 500. I bought a sewing machine but I could not operate the sewing machine and hence my mother-in-law sent me to my mother's place to learn sewing. I joined the sewing class but within 15 days I took ill and started working at home.

Then one of my friends suggested that should do a course in beauty parlour. I met the owner-madam of Rasika beauty parlour who told me that one must be at least Xth standard pass. I felt dejected but seeing my strong desire to do the course, the madam admitted me to the course. I also joined the fashion designing course elsewhere. Since I was just VIIth standard pass! I experienced many difficulties but the madam always helped me. Once I could not understand the meaning of the word 'eve brow' but the madam encouraged me to learn and boosted my confidence. She advised me to appear for HSC and later told me about Yashwantrao Chavar Maharashtra Open University. I followed her advice and enrolled in the university and passed

I always felt like a caged parrot and when I read a story in the Vth standard textbook about a boy who is caught in a similar situation as I was, I immediately identified myself with that boy.

I felt as it was my own story in another

context. But I was saddled with the duty of ensuring that all the kids in the household got education. Now the daughter has completed her D.Ed, one son is doing MVSC while another has just cleared the entrance test for engineering college. Besides being parent and teacher to these children, I also adopted five other children irrespective of their caste and religion and educated them. My husband's friend Mr Prahlad Toge helped me fill the exam form for SSC. I cleared the exam in 1993 but I still wanted to learn and hence contacted the study centre of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University (YCMOU) at Balbheem college. The centre head Dr Hanmant Patil and his colleague Suresh Mhaske helped me a lot and I secured admission in the Open University in 1995. a citizen. It made her a socially committed person for the greater good of the society.


Babli Raut of Rasulpur village in Amravati district | could have chosen to live a married life happily. But she chose the path of social service and left no stone unturned to change mindset





Unfortunately, my studies suffered and I failed in almost all the subjects in the Xth standard except science. All my classmates went ahead of me in academics. Later I lost interest in study and decided to devote full time to the newspaper delivery work and running the paan kiosk. My younger brother

also stopped his education after SSC. He used to help me in my work and my family's economic condition improved somewhat. My elder siste was married. My elder brother continued to study and he passed SSC with 78 percent of marks. He did an IIT course and worked as a trainee in private company in Sinnar. Once he read about the UPSC exam and he told us about it. He sais he wanted to be an IAS officer and that we should support him financially. We assured him of our support and told him to study without work He later graduated and went to Pune for further education.

Meanwhile, I became an avid reader newspapers and collected the articles and the clippings of the news items I liked. I though I should also become a journalist. But I was Xth class fail. However, my elder brother told mabout Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Ope University and how I could fulfill my dream. In not only brought an admission form but als helped me fill it in. He told me to clear the paselection test and I did accordingly.

I got admission into the three year lor course of journalism. I completed the journalis course with dedication. After completing his school education, Haresh decided to study for university degree and took admission in a college in Sangamner. He enrolled himself for science stream. But soon he realized that chemistry and physic did not interest him. Or rather the way those subjects were taught in the college was wrong. But then his life took a turn for better when he learned about the YCMOU study centre in his college. He contacted the teachers and staffers of the centre and discussed his problem with them. He got a good guidance from them for pursuing university degree.

He took admission in the first year of BA degree of the YCMOU. He appeared for B.Sc papers of Pune University and BA of the YCMOU at the same time. He cleared the first year of BSc as well as BA. 
Haresh could go to the US to pursue research. This is a speaking instance of how the YCMOU keeps the needs of the students in mind.

However, here came a woman who breached the male dominion. Sangeeta Dhoke not only excelled in sheep-keeping and selling, but she also completed her incomplete

Besides farming, the villagers look upon poultry and animal husbandry as the complimentary business.

But Sangeeta's father Jagannathrao Dhoke did not follow the traditional business of tending sheep. Instead he established himself as a scribe and started a small grocery store and thus supported his family on meagre income. burden of family fell on Sangeeta's shoulders. Soon she started poultry business but suffered heavy losses. However Sangeeta did not lose hope and decided to keep sheep. She collected some money and bought 5 sheep. Due

to her dedication, her 5 sheep multiplied into 20 sheep within 3 years. She later sought loan of Rs 3 lakh from Punyashlok Ahilyabai Sheli-Mendhi Development Corporation and built a proper shelter for sheep.


She sold her sheep to 'bachat gats' and bought young ones. When they grew up, she sold them. Now Sangeeta had established herself

well in the business and she had some running capital in hand. Meanwhile she bought 5 acres of land. She farmed her field earned decently. However, she also faced many problems which were created by the jealous people and the relatives of the goat suppliers in the Sheli-Mendhi Corporation. She met with resistance in the initial years but her unyielding nature saw her triumph over all the difficulties. 



I added some choice plants to the house garden. But I thought that I should learn agriculture, horticulture and floriculture in a scientific way.

I was busy in my DTP business. A day arrived in my life when I became a student of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University. I still remember that day. I am extremely grateful to Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University (YCMOU). Had they not started a farming course, I would never have been able to nurture my interest. I met a highly educated farmer though he looked like a farm hand. He possessed sophisticated knowledge about the farming techniques and the guidance he gave me proved to be of great value in writing my thesis.

I feel that the university should lay more stress on the practical aspects rather than theory one. 

of superstition. This research is helping me to bring the disadvantaged sections of the tribal community into the mainstream of society. Å



As an acknowledgement of that, my school won the first prize in the science exhibition held at the national level.

Akhil Bharatiya Andhashraddha Nirmulan Samiti helped me a lot in my anti-superstition work. I delivered more than 500 lectures, telling people how outdated customs are hindering their progress and the need to dump them. My drive against the custom of animal sacrifice is getting good response. Enough awareness has been created on this front. My research at the YCMOU is responsible for this success.



Research widened my outlook

I am Dr Sunanda Patil. The research conducted by me at the YCMOU has given a new meaning to my life. It has added a new dimension to my personality. A Knowledge is indeed power. The more we immerse ourselves with research, the more we acquire the science of better ways of living. The Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University is doing a commendable job in encouraging research.

To many people, the word ā€œresearchã€ carries the connotations of a rigorous and labor intensive academic activity in fulfillment of a school course requirement. Others may think of it as a cerebral activity heavily bombarded with complicated mathematical and scientific formulas by the radical thinkers wearing thick eyeglasses and robed under white oversized laboratory gowns. Fortunately, research is not all about the academics as it may have practical uses to oneae™s daily activities. Before getting ahead, it may be beneficial to distinguish two forms of research: basic and applied. Basic research is designed to advance knowledge of a certain discipline, let's say biology or physics, with no application to existing problems in view and with its audience consisting almost exclusively of other scholars or researchers concerned about expanding a phenomenon or body of knowledge. On the other hand, applied research

is designed to solve particular existing problems with a much larger audience — either scientists or laypersons — who are eager to benefit from it. Either way, research adheres stringently to the scientific process. To be scientific, it means that a certain set of empirical procedures are followed to establish the reliability and validity of the findings from the moment a scientific guess or presumption about a phenomenon is conceived until it is tested in an experiment and a generalization is drawn about it. Simply put, a research is not based on one's whims or personal beliefs.

The purpose of my research was to improve the health of society. I studied the Banjara community in Khandesh though their folklore, customs, traditions, culture and language. I found that Banjara women are brilliant and healthy, but due to poverty and ignorance they are lagging behind. I also conducted a behavioral study of the community that concerned itself with tribal thoughts and behaviors.

I got valuable guidance from Dr Ramesh Warkhede. He guided me where I encountered difficulty. An important notion to remember is that neither one type of research is mightier than the other. Instead, it all depends on its applicability. In practical terms, research can make lives easier when used appropriately. For

the academic administrators, they may want to find out what factors are conducive and destructive to the students of this generation and so they conduct a behavioral study to beef up their educational standards.

I am thankful to Yashwantrao Chavan Open University for encouraging me to do research. I got valuable guidance, excellent books and study material, appreciation for my effort. A Truly, the YCMOU is doing yeoman's job in encouraging

the cause of education and research in the society. It is extending the outreach of education to the disadvantaged sections as well as the aspiring professionals with same enthusiasm. There are upsets in everybody's life sometime or the other. I also faced such a lean phase in my life. Since I was BSc in chemistry, I applied for the post of laboratory assistant in a new college. I appeared for the written exam, followed by a round of interview which I cleared successfully. I got the job but the pay was very low. I was paid the wages of Rs 70 per day. I was married and the wages I earned hardly sufficed. I used to get financial support from my family. All my family members including my wife was opposed to me continuing as lab assistant in the college. But I was determined and wanted to create something out of this situation.

The monthly earnings of Rs 1700 was barely sufficient as I had to commute from Nifad to college. Though a lab assistant, there was hardly much difference between me and a peon as far as work and pay was concerned. I was looking for increasing my earnings. So when the computers were introduced in the college, I learnt computer-typing. Then I started typing out the documents of the college. One day Dr B E Kushare (Sir) asked me if I would look after the library. He introduced me to the education society chairman Balasaheb Wagh who cancelled my appointment on daily wages and issued a full time order as a salaried library incharge.

I was told do complete a course in library science. Accordingly, I and my wife took admission for LTC course under the guidance of Datta Pagar. We sought admission but faced money problem. Therefore we contacted Jayant Khadtale and discussed our problem with him. He told us to pay the fee in two instalments. We used to attend the classes on Saturday and Sunday. We successfully passed B.Lib from Yashwantrao



Even as the Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University is celebrating its silver jubilee, I consider myself fortunate to be associated with this great institution. I got the opportunity to work as a trainer at its training centre. I got in touch with Dr Pawankumar Agrawal who gave me the mantra that whatever we should do we should do best. I learnt patience from the dabbewalas of Mumbai and got his insight, determination and hardwork. I learnt from them firm conviction and drive to excel.

My experience of teaching the dabbawalas is great. They have been attending classes for English and computers. They are purely voluntary and are held after work hours and on Sundays," says Gangaram Talekar, Secretary of Nutan Mumbai Tiffin Box Suppliers. Needless to say, there haven't been many dropouts.

The dabbawalas may be perfectly efficient, but knowledge of English would help them improve by leaps and bounds. "It'll be easier for us to read addresses," says Talekar. "Besides, lots of people in South Mumbai don't speak Hindi and Marathi." He points out that the motto of the dabbawalas is to serve everyone in the city, irrespective of language barriers. Computers would help them take orders online, cutting down their dependence on manual labour.

Designed by the Yashwantrao Chavan

Maharashtra Open University Nashik (YCMOU), the three-month course gives the dabbawalas basic knowledge of English and Computers.

The Agrawal Institute of Management and Technology (AIMT) conducts it in Mumbai. Incidentally, Dr Agrawal, president of AIMT, made Mumbai's dabbawalas the subject of his Ph.D. thesis. "YCMOU approached us, saying that they would conduct this course for free. How could we turn down the offer?" asks Talekar. AIMT is conducting their lectures in a simulated local train compartment, to give the dabbawalas an incentive to learn.

Their fully equipped computers have desktops that resemble the exterior of a train. All computers have been personalised, with some displaying images of the dabbawalas with Prince Charles and Richard Branson. Others display their gleeful memories of an interaction with

The lecture starts with a revision of what was taught the previous week. They revise their lessons and recite them every week. I have to make sure they don't forget.

"My name is Gangaram Talekar. I live at Byculla. I am 65 years old," he announced confidently. Applause erupted, as Talekar took his seat, grinning from ear to ear. The others followed suit, with the occasional stutter. If one fumbled, the other jumped to his rescue, putting words in his mouth. I felt the urge to prompt them too. Pronouns and verbs took up the entire second half of the lecture. "I write, he writes, she write, they write," I wrote on the blackboard, as the dabbawalas bent over to scribble furiously in their books. Handwriting surprisingly neat, they followed every instruction to the T. Five more verbs were tackled before I called it a day.



Rehabilitation of jail inmates

So I became a member of the library and started borrowing books to increase my knowledge. There was a TV in my barrack and hence I would watch the programme and then sleep at 9.30pm. I became so fond of reading that I would get up 4 am till the reopening.

Soon I learnt that there is Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University (YCMOU) study centre on the jail premises. I gathered the necessary information and I decided to enroll myself for the BA course. The YCMOU teachers are very cooperative and they helped me fill in the form and also explained to me everything about the entrance exam. I was just IXth standard pass but wanted to study further. I made up my mind to complete my graduation. I started studying in right earnest. I started learning English and borrowed the book 'English with smile' authored by Prof M K Deshpande

Since I was fond of education, I took to studying for my graduation in right earnest. I got the textbook and study material which proved very useful. 

> Though my economic condition was pitiable, the voices in my mind did not let me sit idle. My conscience pricked me to devote my life to secure justice for the suppressed sections of the society. > In 1983, I completed a year-long course in journalism conducted by Pune University. I also joined Prof Shyam Manav's Andhashraddha Nirmulan Samiti and contributed to the exposure of the charlatans and bogus babas. As the movements rose, so did the print media and the movements found their voice reflected

through the newspapers. I joined 'Rambhoomi' newspaper edited by Madhukar Buwa. That time Nashik was not as developed as it is today. The newspaper provided me a forum to express my views and opinions on the burning issues of the day. I did survey of the schools as directed by the editor and covered almost all the schools in the district by walking, cycling or using the public transport. I presented the problems faced by the schools in my report. During a communal riot in Nashik, I slept in the newspaper office for almost a fortnight. While working as a report and covering social, educational, political and cultural beats, I got introduced to many great persons and my network expanded. I wrote fearlessly and won admiration from the readers.

Soon after, I joined Deshdoot under the editorship of late Suresh Awdhoot and I wrote on a variety of subjects for the seven years. I travelled far and wide to know the problems faced by the people and highlighted them in my reports and special column 'Postmortem'. I also worked as a correspondent for Deshdoot Times and also freelanced for Chitralekha. Almost all the editors of leading newspapers knew me through my writings. I also wrote for Kalnirnaya of Jyotibhaskar Jayant Salgonkar. My special reports like 'Malegavatil Kadakyachi Thandi', Na chirtach dolyat pani ananara Kanda', Nagbali' were greatly appreciated and won me prizes and awards. I also worked under Dadasaheb Potnis for Gaonkari newspaper for two years. Hemant

Kulkarni, present editor of Lokmat gave me an opportunity to string for Loksatta. Soon I became a regular correspondent for Loksatta and was sent to Malegaon to cover the communal riot. I camped there for six days and untiringly reported on the developing situation there. My dedication won me a certificate of commendation from the great editor Arun Tikekar. I was assigned the responsibility of editing 'Vrutant' supplement of Loksatta which I carried out with great commitment. Due to my special and exclusive reports that highlighted the drought, land scams and sordid scandals, I won the Editor In chief Award.

Considering the changing dimensions of journalism, I decided to update my knowledge and sought admission for a diploma course in journalism in Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University. But I realized that it was not enough and hence I once again took admission in the YCMOU for BA M.CJ course.

Due to my education in the YCMOU, many doors of opportunities opened for me. Since I already had enough experience of working in newspapers, it helped me a lot. "My daughter was born with talent, but the most important thing I taught her was while learning to do chores," Samitra says proudly. "At home she used to wash dishes,

The decision paid off in 2010, with Kavita's success at the Commonwealth Games. "We saw her on TV. When she held the Indian flag, my eyes were full of tears," Samitra says, brimming with pride. And hopefully there's more to come at this year's Olympic Games.



She holds the current Indian National record for 10 km road running with a mark of 34:32. She won the bronze medal in 10,000 metres race at the 2010 Commonwealth Games, the first individual track medal by an Indian woman athlete at the Commonwealth Games. She also won the silver medal in 10,000 metres race at the 2010 Asian Games. By walking long distance to the forest, doing household chores, this lady learnt tenacity and perseverance; and both attributes helped her rise to fame. Whatever situation you are going through right now, that's your training for reigning! Even if its a harsh one, you might say; YES, even if its a harsh one.

Always have it at the back of your mind that all things work together for your good. It does not matter what situation we are faced with, what matters is our response to the situation. God is able to turn any situation around for your good!

Though she got married in less than a

week, Raut decided participate in Federation the National Cup Athletics Senior Championships as she wanted to test the waters following two months of training at the national camp in Bangalore. The rustiness showed both in the manner

of her victory and also the time she clocked. It was only in the last 200 metres that Raut went ahead of Lalita Babar to assure herself first place and the time of 35:30.21 was nearly three and a half minutes off her personal best. But for someone who was running her first 10,000m race in nearly eight months, Raut didn't have high expectations. "After failing to qualify for the Olympics I was rather depressed. I had trained abroad and worked really hard to qualify for London but it was not to be. But once I got the Arjuna award I really felt confident that I could still aim to win medals at the big events," Raut said.
